

ABOUT THIS RESOURCE SHEET

Caprice explores one girl's relationships with her family and her community; with herself, her creativity, and her personal goals and achievements; and with a devastating trauma she's kept secret for years. It can be challenging for educators and caregivers to address important topics like child sexual abuse with young people, and the websites and articles listed on this resource sheet are intended to prepare adults to support and protect the young readers in their lives. Page 2 of this one sheet lists resources geared towards educators and caregivers regarding trauma-informed education and addressing the topic and prevention of child sexual abuse and how to support survivors.



Resources for Educators and Caregivers: Understanding and Preventing Child Sexual Abuse

Please be aware that *Caprice* explores several topics that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) consider Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). ACEs include "potentially traumatic experiences that occur in childhood (0–17 years)" as well as "aspects of the child's environment that can undermine their sense of safety, stability, and bonding." Educators should exercise discretion when bringing these topics and this title into an educational setting, with opportunities for students to select an alternative title if they are not comfortable with the subject matter. As a young child, the protagonist of *Caprice* experiences parental separation, manipulation, and sexual abuse by an adult relative. The CDC considers child sexual abuse a "significant but preventable public health problem." While estimates vary across studies, data provided by the CDC reveals that about 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 13 boys experience child sexual abuse at some point in childhood. Moreover, 91% of child sexual abuse is perpetrated by someone the child or child's family knows. However, as in *Caprice*, many who experience child sexual abuse wait to report it, or never report it. Learn more: cdc.gov/violenceprevention/childsexualabuse/fastfact.html

Trauma-informed educational practices include social and emotional support, as well as the adoption of classroom and whole-school models that support those who may have experienced trauma directly or indirectly. Considerations should also be made for educators who may experience secondary trauma as the result of bearing witness to another's direct experience with a traumatic event or a series of traumatic occurrences.
